Role of parents and carers



 The primary role in a child's sex and relationship education lies with their parents or carers.

- Parents and carers are best placed to know the stage of development that their child is at
 - whether emotional, physical or social.

Role of the school

SRE is part of our Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) curriculum.

Department for Education (DfE) recommends that all primary schools should have a sex and relationship education programme tailored to the age and the physical and emotional maturity of the children.

Our Aims (1)



- To provide an environment in which children may develop a healthy self-esteem and respect for their bodies and the bodies of others.
- To develop a sense of personal identity that will reinforce the child's growing ability to make the choices of behaviour and lifestyle which are right for them.
- To understand the nature of many types of personal relationships, including friendship, family relationships, love and conflict.
- To develop an understanding of the physical, emotional and sexual development of human beings leading to preparation for puberty.

Our Aims (2)



- To provide an acceptable, accurate sexual vocabulary in Key Stage 2.
- To counter stereotypical gender attitudes.
- To develop communication skills speaking, listening, negotiating and assertiveness.
- To provide the necessary knowledge and develop the skills required to enable children to keep themselves safe and understand that they have rights over their own body.
- To develop respect for their own bodies and the importance of sexual activity as part of a committed, long-term, and loving marriage.


Organisation

	KS1 Scheme Lesson 7 – How we love and care for our friends	Pupils will learn about saying sorry and think about times when this might be difficult.




Lower key stage 2



Year 3	KS2 Scheme Lesson 1 – Making me	Pupils will think about the factors that contribute to identity and what makes someone valuable.
	KS2 Scheme Lesson 2 – My world, your world	Pupils will think about how their lives interact with other people's lives and how this affects decision making.
Year 4	KS1 Scheme Lesson 4 – How our bodies are different	Pupils will learn about the differences between male and female. They will also think about how to show respect for one another. They will learn how to label, love and care for their bodies.
	KS2 Scheme Lesson 3 – Changing bodies	Pupils will think about the physical and emotional changes that take place during puberty.

Upper key stage 2





Year 5	KS2 Scheme Lesson 4 – Firm foundations	Pupils will think about what provides firm foundation for a relationship and how awareness of this might affect whom they date.
	KS2 Scheme Lesson 5 - Marriage	Pupils will reflect on the significance and meaning of the wedding service and marriage and how these benefit the individual and the community.
Year 6	KS2 Scheme Lesson 6 - Great expectations?	Pupils will think about the meaning of sex and why it is best kept for marriage.
	KS2 Scheme Lesson 7 – In need of restoration?	Pupils will think about the role of forgiveness in sustaining and deepening relationships.
	KS2 Scheme Lesson 8 - Summary activities	Pupils will reflect on what they have learnt.

Parents Right to Withdraw
